Dear Parishioners,

Not all of us can remember our fathers. There are the unfortunate few who've never known them, usually because their fathers died before we got a chance to know them, or because of any number of unhappy reasons. Those of us who have lost their fathers from this life when we were quite young may have hazy memories of them as the years and the decades pass. I can only speak of my own dad from the perspective of the 1950s and 1960s, which was part of a radically different cultural age from our recent few years and past four decades.

I am aware of a few fathers of our parish who are Christian inspirations as parents, and I'm sure that there are many more whom I've seen as faces and worshippers at weekly Masses, and among the majority of fathers of our parish children who regularly do not make time for their hour-long serious personal obligation to participate at Mass even on a semi-regular basis.

My own dad was born and raised in Kearney, NJ, the first child of four and the eldest of three sons to Irish immigrant parents from counties Tyrone and Derry. He served in the Pacific theater of war from 1941 until 1945 mostly as a staff sergeant and married my mother, his pre-war sweetheart, in 1945. He was a husband and father who was a quiet man, not one to show outward signs of affection, but one who, with my mother, raised his three sons and two daughters in the Ironbound ("Down Neck") section of Newark from 1948 until his death from cancer at 52 in December of 1970 with unflinching dedication. He worked from 11am until 9pm five days a week in downtown Newark. He dedicated his life to his wife and five children, and he was a daily worshipper at Mass (except Saturdays), 8am Masses six days a week, as his dad, my grandfather, attended 6am daily weekday Masses most of his adult life in Queens, Kearney, Jersey City, and Kenilworth, NJ. It was my dad's regular attendance at Mass (before his breakfast and ten hours at work) and my voluntary accompaniment with him at weekday Mass in St. Casimir Church, until I became an altar boy at the end of third grade before the 8:25am adjacent elementary school's "first bell" that, I believe, was the seed of my calling to be a priest.

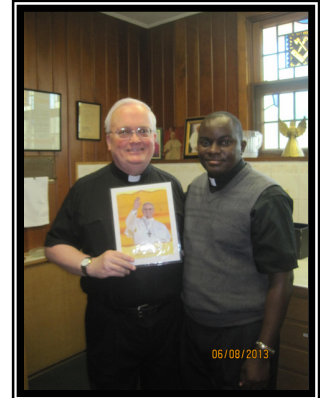
There are far greater examples of exemplary Catholic Christian fathers among the parishioners I've served in parishes full-time for the past 16 years and as a full-time high school teaching priest for 18 years before that, I'm sure; I've been blessed to meet and have met a few, both at the boys' Catholic high schools and parish churches where I've served. May God bless these dads and may God's Spirit motivate many more to live their Faith effectively for at least some, if not many, to notice and emulate.

RE-REGISTERING STUDENTS

You may also drop it off to our SCHOOL office thru June 27th, Monday thru Thursday, 9:30 am to 3:30 pm. CLOSED FRIDAYS. **Use the Front door, ring bell. Absolutely no re-registrations will be taken after June 27th, your child will have to wait for the 2014-15 year.**

Classes begin on Tuesday September 17th or Wednesday September 18th 2013. No other notice will be sent home to you. Class assignments will be posted on those days.

Promises of the Rosary Three of Fifteen Promises

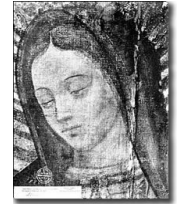
Catholic Charities' Emergency & Community Services to Hold Job Fair on June 20

United States Conference of Catholic Bishops Fact Sheet

CURRENT THREATS TO RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

Pope Benedict XVI spoke last year about his worry that religious liberty in the United States is being weakened. He called religious liberty the “**most cherished of American freedoms.**”

However, unfortunately, our most cherished freedom is under threat:

□ ***HHS mandate for sterilization, contraception, and abortion inducing drugs.***

The mandate of the Department of Health and Human Services forces religious institutions to facilitate and/or fund a product contrary to their own moral teaching. Further, the federal government tries to define which religious institutions are “religious enough” to merit protection of their religious liberty.

□ ***Catholic foster care and adoption services.***

Boston, San Francisco, the District of Columbia, and the State of Illinois have driven local Catholic Charities out of the business of providing adoption or foster care services—by revoking their licenses, by ending their government contracts, or both—because those Charities refused to place children with same-sex couples or unmarried opposite-sex couples who cohabit.

□ ***State immigration laws.*** Several states have recently passed laws that forbid what they deem as “harboring” of undocumented immigrants—and what the Church deems Christian charity and pastoral care to these immigrants.

□ ***Discrimination against small church congregations.*** New York City adopted a policy that barred the Bronx Household of Faith and other churches from renting public schools on weekends for worship services, even though non-religious groups

could rent the same schools for many other uses. Litigation in this case continues.

□ ***Discrimination against Catholic humanitarian services.***

After years of excellent performance by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops’ Migration and Refugee Services (MRS) in administering contract services for victims of human trafficking, the federal government changed its contract specifications to require MRS to provide or refer for contraceptive and abortion services in violation of Catholic teaching.

□ ***Christian students on campus.*** In its over-100-year history, the University of California Hastings College of Law has denied student organization status to only one group, the Christian Legal Society, because it required its leaders to be Christian and to abstain from sexual activity outside of marriage.

Is our most cherished freedom truly under threat?

Yes, Pope Benedict XVI recognized just last year that various attempts to limit the freedom of religion in the U.S. are particularly concerning. The threat to religious freedom is larger than any single case or issue and has its roots in secularism in our culture. The Holy Father has asked for the laity to have courage to counter secularism that would “delegitimize the Church’s participation in public debate about the issues which are determining the future of American society.”

What can you do to ensure the protection of religious freedom at home and abroad?

The U.S. Bishops have called for a Fortnight for Freedom from June 21 to July 4.
